Here's an idea you might want to try, I've been doing it for years and it works well for me. On any engine that's gonna sit all winter, drain most of the gas from the tank, leaving enough for about 15 minutes of run time, then mix a little oil or transmission fluid with what's left. Start it up & let it run till it runs out. The oil will coat the bottom of the tank, sediment bowl, lines and carburetor as it's running through. You'll have an easy startup next spring simply by adding some fresh gas. I know a lot of folks swear by Sta-Bil, which is fine, but regular oil or transmission fluid does the same thing cheaper. Try it, you'll thank me next spring.
